## **BIBLE STORY: GENESIS 37-45 (JOSEPH)**


## **STORY: CREATION**

# REVIEW - CREATION

#### REVIEW

Guide 9 acts as a review for the preceding weeks. Use this guide and devotion to support, reinforce, and review concepts learned throughout the past weeks and to test your child's understanding and memory of these truths.

**DISCOVER IT:** (Use the passage to illustrate the Big Truth.) Genesis 37:12-28; 41:1-42:24; 45:1-8; 46:1-3; 50:15-20

#### THINK ABOUT IT: (Use the commentary to reinforce the Big Truth.)

Joseph followed God and was gifted by God to understand dreams. This made his brothers jealous, so they sold him into slavery. On the surface, this can seem like just a bad story about the bad things that Joseph's brothers did. If we look closer, we will see that it is a story about how God is in control of all things, even the things that seem bad to us in the moment. While Joseph was enslaved, he did not sin but instead continued to follow God. God blessed him and gave him favor with others so that he began to be a leader in Egypt. A famine came but God had made it so that they had extra food in Egypt, which allowed Joseph to provide food for many people, including the brothers that had sold him into slavery before. Joseph was reunited with his brothers and his father. At the end of the story, Joseph is able to forgive his brothers because he knows that God is in control of all things. Joseph's brothers meant the things that they did for evil, but God meant them for good, and God is all-powerful and is in control of all things.

#### **TALK ABOUT IT:** (Use the questions to discuss the Big Truth)

- What are some things that happened in Joseph's life?
- What are some of the ways that you see God is working in Joseph's story?
- Who is in control of our lives? (God is in control. Not us, not other people, God)
- What are some examples of things that God is in control of? (God is in control of all things)



As a family, memorize Psalm 138:8 by playing a game of Hangman with your child. Play a couple of times until they have learned the verse.

Help your child create a coat of many colors like Joseph had using a paper coat template and markers or watercolors. Talk with your child about how God used Joseph's hard times for Joseph's good and eventually reunited his family.

Using several pieces of paper taped together or one long piece of paper, help your child make a timeline of Joseph's life beginning with the time he received the coat of many colors. Use Genesis 37, 39-46 to help you plot the events of his life. Talk with your child about how God used each event for His glory and Joseph's good.

Before bedtime, spend a few moments thanking God for the way He works things for our good.
