STORY: REDEMPTION

GOD IS OUR SUBSTITUTE

BIG TRUTH: GOD IS OUR SUBSTITUTE

Isaiah 53:4-6; John 1:1-3; 18; Romans 5:6-11; 8:1-4; Galatians 3:13-14; Ephesians 5:1-2; 1 Peter 2:22-24; 3:18; 1 John 2:1-2; 4:9-10

BIBLE VERSE: 2 CORINTHIANS 5:21

"For our sake He made Him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in Him we might become the righteousness of God."

BIG IDEAS

- We cannot save ourselves.
- God sent His Son to be our sinless sacrifice.
- Jesus died in our place.
- Substitution is final and forever.

BIBLE STORY: GENESIS 22

Abraham was God's servant. God had promised to make a great nation through Abraham and He began by giving Abraham a son named Isaac. God tested Abraham's faith when He asked Abraham to sacrifice Isaac. Abraham obeyed God and set out to give Isaac as a sacrifice, but God stopped him before he killed Isaac. God provided a ram in a thicket nearby to take the place of Isaac as the sacrifice. Jesus is our substitute just as the ram was Isaac's substitute. Jesus took our place and paid our sin debt.

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Thankfully, God does not just leave us in the broken world, but is repairing the brokenness through His Son. From the very beginning of time, God promised He would fix creation, and He kept His promise by sending Jesus to rescue us from our sin. Jesus came to live on the earth and willingly died on the cross so that sin's power over creation would be broken forever.

BIG AIMS



Every child should know that:

• By grace alone, through faith alone, in Christ alone, we can be reconciled to God.



Every child should feel:

• Thankful that God would send His Son so that we could be reconciled to Him



Every child should:

 Pursue reconciliation in their relationships with friends and family because God has made a way for them to be reconciled back to Him



Every child should want:

• To honor God and live in restored relationship with Him





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FINALLY FOREVER

As a family, spend a night trying to count the stars in the sky. Set a timer to see how long it takes you to count as many stars as you can in your section of the sky. Talk with your child about how the stars seem to go on forever, but they aren't forever. God's redemption of His people is forever and final.

DISCOVER IT: (Use the passage to illustrate the Big Truth.) Genesis 22.

THINK ABOUT IT: (Use the commentary to reinforce the Big Truth.)

Abraham had long followed God and been obedient to Him. Many years before, God had promised to give Abraham a son and to make a great nation through him. Abraham believed God and God gave Abraham, Isaac, his only son. One day, God asked Abraham to do a difficult thing for Him. He asked Abraham to take Isaac to the top of the mountain and to offer Isaac as a burnt offering to God. A burnt offering was an offering that was burned up completely. Abraham loved Isaac. Isaac was his only son. Abraham loved God more. He trusted God and so he obeyed God. Abraham took Isaac to the top of the mountain and they built an altar together. Abraham laid Isaac on the altar and prepared to sacrifice him to God, but God's voice broke through and stopped Abraham. God had tested Abraham's faith in Him and when Abraham showed that he did really trust God, God stopped him from sacrificing his only son. A sacrifice was still needed for the offering. God provided a ram caught in a thicket nearby for Abraham and Isaac to offer to Him. Abraham and Isaac offered the ram to God with thanksgiving. He had provided a substitute for Isaac. God provided a substitute for all of His people when He sent Jesus to pay our sin debt. We all are sinful and owe a great sin debt that we cannot pay ourselves. God didn't leave us in need. Instead, He sent His only Son, Jesus to die on the cross in our place. Jesus took our place and became our substitute. Because of Jesus we don't have to pay our sin debt when we have saving faith in Him.

TALK ABOUT IT: (Use the questions to discuss the Big Truth)

- What did God ask Abraham to do? (He asked Abraham to offer Isaac as a burnt offering to God.)
- How did Abraham respond to what God asked Abraham to do? (He obeyed.)
- How did Abraham show he trusted God? (He took Isaac to the mountain and prepared to sacrifice him.)
- What substitute did God provide for Isaac? (He provided a ram caught in a thicket.)
- Who did God send to be our substitute? (He sent His only Son, Jesus.)
- Why did we need a substitute? (We are all sinful and in need of someone to save us.)







As a family, memorize 2 Corinthians 5:21 by playing a game of Hangman using the verse as the phrase to guess.

Take your child on a scavenger hunt throughout your house or neighborhood searching for as many circular things that he or she can find. Talk with your child about how a circle has no beginning and no end. Talk with your child about how God's substitution of Jesus in our place is final and forever.

Spend some time this week sharing your own salvation story with your child. Talk about how Jesus paid for your sins and took your place as your substitute. Share with your child how this substitution is forever and always.

Spend some time this week in the mornings as your child gets ready for the day talking about how God sent Jesus to be our substitute. Talk with your child about what it means to you that Jesus is your substitute.
