BIG TRUTH: OUR SIN WRECKS GOD'S GOOD CREATION

Romans 8:18-22; Genesis 3:17-19; James 1:15; Romans 1:22-23, 5:12; Isaiah 59:2

BIBLE VERSE: GENESIS 3:8-9

And they heard the sound of the Lord God walking in the garden in the cool of the day, and the man and his wife hid themselves from the presence of the Lord God among the trees of the garden. But the Lord God called to the man and said to him, "Where are you?"

BIG IDEAS

- Sin wrecks our relationship with God.
- Sin wrecks our relationship with creation.
- Sin wrecks our relationships with others and ourselves.

BIBLE STORY: GENESIS 3:8-24

When Adam and Eve disobeyed God, the good creation that God had made was broken. Sin entered the world through their disobedience and nothing was ever the same. Death and sorrow became a part of every person's life and Adam and Eve were separated from God. Our sin wrecks everything.

THE STORY

The Story is the good news of the gospel. All of Scripture tells the Story of God the Father's work to redeem a people from the power of sin through God the Son so that they might live for His glory through the power of the Holy Spirit. During this series we will explore the four main movements of the Story of God, and our response to the life-altering Gospel Story!

BIG AIMS



Every child should know that:

- God is the author, subject, and hero of the gospel story
- Salvation comes by grace alone, through faith alone, in Christ alone



Every child should strive to:

- Describe the gospel message through Creation, Fall, Redemption, and New Creation
- Memorize the Bible verse each week



Every child should feel:

- Brokenness over the depth of our sin against God
- Joy in Jesus, our Savior and King



Every child should want:

- To study the Bible so that they can better understand God's story of redemption
- To share the gospel story with those who are separated from God in their sin

FAMILY DEVOTION: A BROKEN WORLD

The world we live in is broken and sinful. This brokenness first happened when Adam and Eve sinned against God. Every person born after them was and is born with a sin nature, which leads them to continue sinning and further breaking God's good creation.



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Sin leads to feelings of guilt and shame.

"And they heard the sound of the Lord God walking in the garden in the cool of the day, and the man and his wife hid themselves from the presence of the Lord God..."

- Before Adam and Eve disobeyed God, life was perfect in the Garden of Eden. They enjoyed a daily relationship with God and they were free from shame and guilt because they had not broken God's law.
- After they disobeyed God, they were no longer free of guilt. They were the opposite—guilty. They had broken God's law and His creation. Now, because they were guilty, they had to deal with feelings of guilt and shame. We, too, are sinners and break God's law. We have guilt and shame because of our disobedience.

Sin separates us from God.

"...and the man and his wife hid themselves from the presence of the Lord God among the trees in the garden."

- In the beginning, Adam and Eve were not separated from God. They enjoyed daily fellowship with Him. Their relationship was good and unhindered by sin. After they ate the forbidden fruit, their relationship with God changed. They were separated from Him because of their sin.
- Our sin separates us from God. We are all born sinful and because of this sin, we there is a great divide between God and us. We do not naturally seek God, so as we live, our sin leads us away from Him.

Sin puts us under God's judgment.

"But the Lord God called to the man and said to him, 'Where are you?'"

- After Adam and Eve ate the forbidden fruit, their eyes were opened and for the first time they experienced the effects of disobedience. They hid themselves from Him, afraid to be in His presence. Before they disobeyed Him, they had not been afraid of Him. Sin changes relationships.
- Our sin puts us under God's judgment. Just as Adam and Eve had to face God's judgment for their disobedience, we all are under His judgment for our sinfulness. Unless we repent and believe in Jesus as our Savior, we will face God's final judgment and be held accountable for our sin.

BIBLE STORY: GENESIS 3:8-24

Consequences of Disobedience

Opening Illustration:

Bring a container of big blocks. Have the preschoolers try to build a tower with the blocks. Help the preschoolers see how tall they can build their tower. Talk with them about how God's creation was perfect when He made it, but man's sin wrecked it. Our sin wrecks His good creation, too.

BIG IDEA: SIN WRECKS OUR RELATIONSHIP WITH GOD.¹

Our sin nature separates us from God.

- In the beginning, everything that God made was good and without sin. Adam and Eve had no sin in them until they broke God's law and disobeyed Him in the Garden of Eden. When they ate the forbidden fruit, sin entered their hearts and the world. Their sin changed the very nature of human beings. From then on, every person born after them was and is born with a sinful nature. This means that we are all born with hearts that are enslaved to sin and bent toward sinning.
- Sin separates us from God. There is a great chasm, or divide between mankind and God because of man's sin. God is holy and righteous, and we are not.



Read Luke 15, the story of the lost sheep, with the preschoolers. Talk through how we are like the lost sheep. Our sin leads us away from God, our Shepherd and we are lost. Remind them that God leads us to Him and rescues us.

Sin changed Adam and Eve's relationship with God.

- Adam and Eve enjoyed an intimate relationship with God before their sin. They were created for that relationship, just as we are created for a relationship with God. Though no one born after Adam and Eve enjoyed the same type of relationship with God, we are all created for that relationship. It is how God made us, creating us in His image to know Him and be known by Him.
- When Adam and Eve sinned, their relationship with God changed. They no longer enjoyed daily walks with God or a relationship free of shame and guilt. They were no longer at peace with God.

Our sin nature leads us away from God.

• Our sin natures lead us to seek our own glory and to pursue our own desires. We naturally reject God and His purposes, forsaking the one true God for our own way. This leads us farther and farther away from God.

How does our sin wreck our relationship with God? (Our sin leads us away from God and causes a great divide between God and man.)



BIG IDEA: SIN WRECKS OUR RELATIONSHIP WITH CREATION.²

God's creation was perfect in the beginning.

- Only God can create perfect things and He did when He made the heavens and the earth. The world He created was perfect and without sin. Adam and Eve were perfect and without sin in the beginning.
- Everything functioned perfectly because there was no sin in it. This is because God is perfect and all that He does is good and perfect. He cannot sin; therefore, everything He does is without sin.



Show the preschoolers pictures of different animals. Ask the preschoolers to raise their hands if they are afraid of the animal in the picture you show them. Once you've shown all the pictures of animals, talk with them about how our sin wrecked our relationship with creation.

Man's disobedience caused sin to enter God's good creation.

- Before Adam and Eve disobeyed God in the garden, there
 was no sin in the world. The world did not know death or
 sorrow. There was no pain or hurt. Life was good, perfect,
 and peaceful.
- After Adam and Eve ate the forbidden fruit, sin entered the world. The future of the world changed in that moment as death, the consequence of sin, entered the world.³

Creation reveals the brokenness of the world.4

- The world reveals the evidence of sin through the darkness that now characterizes it. What was once good and perfect is now dark and broken. Once, the world yielded its fruit easily, but now, there are famines, natural disasters, and disease present. The world has continuously decayed as sin as pervaded every part of it.
- Man's sinfulness has broken the world's structures. Where once there was harmony and peace, now there is violence and war. Brothers fight brothers and nations war against one another.

How did man's sin break creation? (Man's sin introduced death and sorrow to the world.)

^{2.} Genesis 3:18-19: Creation no longer willingly yielded food for mankind after they sinned. Life would be difficult on earth as a result of sin.

^{3.} Romans 5:12: It is through the sin of Adam that sin and death entered God's created world.

^{4.} Romans 8:19-23: The natural world groans for the return of Christ when He will make all things new.

BIG IDEA: SIN WRECKS OUR RELATIONSHIPS WITH OTHERS AND OURSELVES.⁵

Sin changes our relationship with others.

- Sin affects every part of our lives. It begins in our hearts, and from our hearts come our thoughts and actions. Adam and Eve lived in harmony with one another, each content to fulfill his or her created purpose. After they sinned, their relationship changed. After sin, living in harmony became difficult and a challenge. They were no longer comfortable with one another.
- Our sin affects our relationship with other people. Friendships and relationships are hard because of our sinfulness. Because we are sinful, we often experience jealousy, strife, and fighting in our relationships. We may not trust others or think the very best of them. Instead, we judge them and think the worst of them.



Play a game of musical beanbag. The preschooler holding the beanbag when the music stops gets to name one thing that makes a person a good friend. Help the preschoolers think of traits of good friends. Remind them that our sin wrecks our friendships and makes them harder.

Sin causes brokenness and bitterness in our relationships.

- No relationship is free of strife. Every relationship beginning with our brothers and sisters involves fighting of some sort. Adam and Eve saw this to be true in their own relationship when they were confronted about eating the forbidden fruit. When asked, Adam blamed Eve for giving him the fruit, revealing the first effects of sin on his heart.
- Our earthly relationships are challenging and often riddled with jealousy and bickering. We experience this because the sin in our hearts makes us all self-centered and unwilling to sacrifice for someone else.


Sin leads us to view ourselves incorrectly.

- Before Adam and Eve disobeyed, they lived in submission to God. He was their Father and Creator. They lived in the world as He had commanded, until they sinned. Because of sin, they viewed themselves as equal to God. They desired the knowledge that the forbidden fruit would give and wanted to be wise in their own eyes.
- Sin distorts our view of ourselves. It either makes us think too highly of ourselves or too lowly. It is a challenge to view ourselves correctly and is impossible without the power of the Holy Spirit inside of us.

How does sin wreck our relationship with others? (It leads to distrust, fighting, and strife in our relationships.)

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HOOKS



Separated By Sin

Bring in two magnets. Make sure the magnets do not attract each other. Show the magnets to the preschoolers. Tell them one magnet represents us and the other represents God. Next, allow the preschoolers to attempt to stick the magnets together. After they all try, tell them that the magnets can't stick together, just like our sin keeps us away from God. Remind them that before sin entered the world, Adam and Eve had a perfect relationship with God. After sin, man's relationship with God was wrecked.



Sin Wrecks Creation

Bring in a balloon with air in it. Draw a world on the balloon. Next, tell the preschoolers that the balloon presents creation before sin entered the world. Next, pop the balloon and remind the preschoolers that our sin broke God's perfect creation.
